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



PUBLIC SPACES





Architecture Paradigm MLR Convention Centre, Bangalore

The design needed to reflect the emerging image of Bangalore and its urban environs. The MLR Convention Centre was visualized as a pavilion structured by an array of portals supporting large column-free spaces for gatherings, performances and celebrations. The design responds to the terrain with modulation of the floor planes resulting in open spaces becoming extensions of internal spaces.



Planet3 Studios Architecture Vidyalankar Institute of Technology, Mumbai

Radically rethinking campus architecture in India, this engineering college is devised as a contemporary 'educational village' consisting of distinct faculty blocks connected by an interior promenade with spaces for student learning activities. Protected from the elements with an oversized roof and a porous skin, that focused first on the needs of the students, second on the educators and third the management.








Collaborative Architecture Wrap 3, a computer training centre, Kerala

Applying the concept of 'nonhierarchical tectonic imagery', the space is conceived as a series of wraps, juxtaposed to create overlapping palimpsests of colour, surface compositions and spatial overlays. The target group of primary and secondary school students, made the design process lean heavily on child perception, creating a wholly informal teaching environment that they could relate to.

HOSPITALITY SPACES





Planet3 Studios Architecture Crossover, Bangalore

There was a requirement of four different dining experiences and offerings in a single restaurant. The challenge was to manage the requirements within the given space, offer dismountable construction solution to cover the terrace in conformity with local byelaws, and create an interior experience to address different patron need-states for varied spaces within the same entity.

Khosla Associates Shiro Pan-Asian Lounge Bar, Mumbai

The notion was to design a Pan Asian lounge bar within the unused Bombay Dyeing Mills at Lower Parel, Mumbai. The clients wanted the design to appeal to the increasingly cosmopolitan tastes of South Mumbai's arrivistes. The space would need to be eclectic, sophisticated and engaging enough to endure the short lived trendy tag associated with many lounge bars.





Atelier Design 'n' Domain White Lounge, Mumbai

Resonating a New York 'loft-like' space, a conscious effort was made to challenge the conventional norms of a lounge bar. Contrary to the usual dark ambiences of its genre, this place is intended to enable people to see each other and chat without having to shout into each other's ears.

GREEN PERSON OF THE YEAR

Dr Darshan Shankar, Executive Director, FRLHT, Bangalore

A pioneer in the area of traditional medicine, Dr Shankar has been the inspiration behind several efforts to strengthen indigenous

health traditions. He is currently implementing the country's largest effort on the conservation of medicinal plants. Dr Shankar is also a key member of several national and international institutions.

GREEN PROJECT OF THE YEAR

Manay Sadhna Activity Centre, Rama Pir Tekra, Wadaj, Ahmedabad

An initiative by the social NGO, Manav Sadhna, the multi-purpose centre serves as an informal school for

children and adults, and as a training unit and activity workshop for the manufacturing of craft-based products by women and the elderly. The designcreator of the Manav Sadhna activity centre is architect Yatin Pandya.





GREEN PRODUCT OF THE YEAR

Terracotta Domestic Waste Composter, Bangalore

Part of the Daily Dump project, the composter is the brainchild of industrial designer Poonam Bir Kasturi. The project involves the design, manufacture, distribution and servicing of products related to home composting.

YOUNG DESIGNER OF THE YEAR

Planet3 Studios Architecture, Mumbai

It's an entireteam that contributes to a successful design. And so it was, that the nine-year-old Planet3 Studios Architecture, headed by Kalhan and Santha Mattoo, was selected for this award.
